



Johnnie Mathias Scholarship for FFA Members

Purpose: To provide financial assistance to FFA members with aspirations to pursue a career in agriculture.

Applicant Eligibility Requirements:

- Graduating high school during the school year in which they apply
- A current member of their FFA chapter
- Enrolled/ing at a two or four year postsecondary institution to major in some area of agriculture
- The local agriculture teacher(s) of the program where the student is enrolled must be current members of KAAE

Scholarship Amount: \$500

Deadline to Apply: April 1st

Award Announcement: Early to mid-May

Scoring Criteria:

- GPA (unweighted on 4.0 scale): 20 points
- ACT/SAT Composite Score: 20 points
- Financial Need: 20 points
- FFA Participation: 20 points
- Essay: 50 points
- Letters of Recommendation: 15 points
- Overall Application Quality: 5 points

Scoring Process: A panel of teachers that do not have a student applying for a scholarship, nor are related to any of the applicants, will score the submissions. Applications will be evaluated using the rubric included in this document.

Application Components

Part I: Basic Student Information

Name, Mailing Address, Email, FFA Chapter

Confirmation of graduation status, FFA membership, and postsecondary plans

Part II: Academic and Financial Information

Unweighted GPA

Highest Composite Score on the ACT or SAT

Household Adjusted Gross Income

Part III: FFA Participation

Applicants will complete and upload the [FFA Participation Document](#) that lists the local, regional, state, and/or national FFA activities in which they have participated during their FFA membership. Only the single page FFA Participation document may be used for this component.

Applicants need to download a copy of the document before filling in their information.

Part IV: Essay

Applicants will submit an essay addressing, “**Why are you pursuing an agriculture career and why do you deserve a KAAE scholarship?**” The essay must be no longer than 500 words, use a font and size that are easily read, and be solely prepared by the applicant.

Part V: Letters of Recommendation

Secure three letters of recommendation from non-family members that can serve as a witness to the applicant’s character, leadership, community engagement, or any other qualities that support a worthiness to receive this scholarship. One of the letters must come from a teacher of agriculture.

Letters may be uploaded individually or as a single file.
